Let's rewind by a year, when juniors and seniors in Mt. Vernon High School's Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG) program, under Mr. James Cochran's leadership, began brainstorming ideas for a project-based service learning project. Wanting to include freshmen and sophomores as well, Mr. Cochran also brought in the Community Service Club.

The group decided to build a raised bed garden that would supply fresh produce for Fortville Christian Church's food pantry. Thus began a hands-on project where students work together

and see the fruit of their labors, literally and figuratively. The garden flourished, producing during its first year about 150 pounds of produce, including bell peppers, zucchini, squash, cucumbers and a variety of tomatoes.

Along the way, students devised creative approaches to maximize results. Realizing that few people would be available for gardening during the summer, students created a self-sustaining system, featuring automatic watering through an irrigation system and weed barriers to eliminate the need for frequent weeding.

In true Mt. Vernon community fashion, various organizations and businesses are assisting. Vernon Township facilitated a grant from the Hancock County Community Foundation to purchase gravel and other materials; Tuttle's Orchard donated plants:



Metal Supermarkets donated metal; Backyard Blessings donated tomato cages; and Schreiber Lumber donated wood. In addition, MVHS's welding classes provided MV stakes and various Mt. Vernon staff members and board members supported the project's development and maintenance.

The garden remains under development, as students consider ways to improve and expand the types of produce. Under consideration are beautifying the landscape surrounding the garden, and possibly adding benches and tables.

Additionally, in these difficult hiring times, MVCSC was able to provide a substantial raise to the classified staff who support all of the great work in our classrooms. The school corporation will conduct pay raise discussions for our teachers during bargaining season this fall.
