Enrollment growth slows; Future Growth Plan adjusted in response

A growing community means a growing school district. With an additional 415 students since the 2018-2019 school year,

This slower enrollment climb is in tandem with a continual decrease in transfer students as we plan to responsibly manage resources needed to construct facilities for the future.

Ensuring that we do not construct new facilities too early or too late requires ongoing tracking of each cohort's growth. When we advanced the recommendations of the Mt. Vernon Community Champions in the spring of 2020, we shared that we would not build until we saw the whites *Continued on page 2*

Groundbreaking Ceremony

LE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Fortville Elementary School and the Transportation Building

A November 30 groundbreaking ceremony for the new Fortville Elementary School (FES) and new Transportation Building spotlighted the strong partnerships that benefit our students and our growing community.

Superintendent Dr. Jack Parker and Mt. Vernon Board of Trustees President Kellie Freeman lauded the community support that has driven the Future Growth Plan initiative and thanked key partners, including construction firm AECOM Hunt, architecture firm Beebe Design and the Town of Fortville.

FES Principal Dr. Vince Edwards discussed how the new elementary will enhance the educational

of their eyes. Thus, this growth is tracking for us to need our new school in the 2025-2026 school year, when we will once again use Fortville Elementary School as a grades five and six intermediate school, relieving pressure in the middle and elementary schools by removing a grade level from each. The additional year delay in constructing the new K-4 Fortville Elementary School on the east side of N 200 E is landing us in the sweet spot for this district-level grade configuration change.

These are exciting times for Mt. Vernon Schools and a drive through the Fortville campus will show all of this great work beginning to take shape. As we focus on serving our students today, it is with a responsible eye on our future that we can provide the best opportunities for our school community to learn and grow together.

experience in line with the district's mission: to Engage, Educate and Empower today's students to seize tomorrow's opportunities.

A planned addition to the current Fortville Elementary School (formerly the Mt. Vernon Intermediate School) was completed by the start of this school year as the space was needed by current students. FES is scheduled to open for the 2025-2026 school year; the Transportation Building is scheduled to be functioning in December of 2023; and the new road on the Fortville campus that will help ease traffic congestion should be open by August 2023.

Dr. Parker has communicated that the high school renovations have been delayed due to lower-than-forecast enrollment growth and are projected to be completed by the fall of 2028. The middle school renovations are also delayed and projected to commence in the fall of 2028. Mt. Vernon leaders will continue to diligently monitor enrollment, construction costs and related factors.
